SAFETY TIP – Car Emergency Kit

ARE YOU ROAD READY?

Being on the road when disaster strikes can put you in a challenging situation. Pack items to last at least 24 hours for each member of your household including your pets.

- Maintain a half tank of gas in case of evacuation or power outages.
- Always check that your tires and spare are in good condition.
- Do not drive through flooded areas. Six inches of water can cause a car to lose control or possibly stall. A foot of water will float many cars.
- Be aware of areas where floodwaters have receded. Roads may have weakened and could collapse under the weight of a car.
- If a power line falls on your car you are at risk of electrical shock. Stay inside until a trained person removes the wire.
- If it becomes hard to control the car, pull over, stop the car and set the parking brake.
- If the emergency could affect the stability of the roadway avoid overpasses, bridges, power lines, signs and other hazards.
- Customize your car kit for your personal needs, weather, and location.



Pack your items in a backpack or duffle.



Make it a habit to fill up when gas is ½ full.

Car Kit

- Water
- Food
- Flashlight and extra batteries
- First aid kit
- Whistle (to signal for help)
- Face masks
- Moist towelettes
- o Paper maps
- Cell phone chargers and a backup battery
- Pet food and water
- Blanket

- Sunscreen
- o Hat
- Paper and pencil
- Extra clothes
- Money (\$1s, \$5s, \$10s)
- Fire extinguisher
- Jumper cables
- Flares or reflective triangle
- lce scraper
- Cat litter or sand (for better tire traction)
- Medications needed for 24 hrs.



Keep small bills on hand: \$1, \$5, & \$10.



Replace water bottles every 6 months. Store away from sunlight.
