Information about Pet Go Bags from Martinez Area CERT

## Pack a Pet Go Bag

Most disasters are unexpected and happen fast. A little preparation now will avoid stress and critical time delays during an emergency or disaster. Pets are important family members, and their needs should be considered in your family's emergency plans. Build a Pet Go Bag using a duffle bag or backpack to hold the items and keep in an easily accessible place. Take the time now to practice carefully placing your pet into their carrier. Keep a Pet Emergency Wallet Card (one is provided below) in your wallet in case you and your pet are separated. #### What's in a Pet Go Bag? Adjust for your pet's specific needs.

- Pet carrier
- Leash/halter/harness
- Water
- Bowls
- Banket
- Toys
- Treats
- Medications
- 1 week supply of food

- Current photos of your pet with you/your family
- Vaccine records
- Waste disposal bags
- Pet ID chip info
- Contact info of vet use the one on the back of this flyer
- Pet first-aid kit

### Plan. Connect. Protect.

- Have an evacuation plan for your pet. If you have a plan in place for you and your pets, you will likely encounter less difficulty, stress, and worry when you need to act quickly during an emergency. Visit <a href="mailto:qopetfriendly.com">qopetfriendly.com</a>. To find pet friendly shelter and hotels.
- Develop a buddy system. Plan with neighbors, friends, or relatives to make sure that someone is available to care for or evacuate your pets if you are unable to do so.
  Keep a Pet Emergency Card in your wallet. Consider leaving an extra house key with a trusted friend or neighbor so they may evacuate your pets if you are not at home.
- Have your pet microchipped. Make sure to keep your address and phone number up-to-date and include contact information for an emergency contact outside of your immediate area.
- Contact your local emergency management office, animal shelter, animal control office, or visit <u>ready.gov/pets</u> to get additional advice and information.
